A letter from our Rector

Studying History and Archaeology in Lympne

We held our AGM in person this year and expressed our appreciation to Guy Topham for his immense contribution to SHAL as he steps down as Treasurer.

Our speaker was Andrew Mayfield, Kent Community Archaeologist, and now archaeologist at Greenwich Park after involvement with the 5th Continent project on Romney Marsh. In a wide-ranging and hugely informative talk he traced the landscapes of the Marsh and their evolution. How did they change? At c.8000 BC what is now Lympne looked down over a huge bay. By the Bronze Age period (2000 BC) the salt marsh was developing followed by the Iron Age (800BC – 54AD) which saw clusters of activity around Lydd and the emergence of the Hythe inlet. The Romans made substantial changes with their important harbour accompanied by a number of Roman sites in the area. The Saxon period {600-800 AD} saw considerable activity at Romney, with a small trading settlement and fishing site at Sandtun below Lympne.

Andrew then focused on the search for Romney Port. Recent archaeological investigations revealed a cluster of activity around Old Romney with evidence of a channel in the early medieval period (1200s), probably part of the earlier Saxon port, pointing to it being a small harbour. Further work and excavations are needed to be certain of the port's existence and its size at Old Romney.

Our speaker at the 17 May meeting will be Jo Ahmet, Kent Finds Liaison Officer, who will talk about the wide range of archaeological finds he has analysed and registered on the Portable Antiquities Scheme. 
