## A Letter from the Rector

What is church? Many people today understand the church as a building. This is not a biblical understanding of the church. The word 'church' is a translation of the Greek word **ekklesia**, which is defined as **'an assembly'**. The meaning of 'church' is not then a building, but a group of people.

I was reminded recently that so much of what we do in church is not formal worship but being together in fellowship in so many different ways. So many, who choose not to attend formal worship, still come along to spend time together through a myriad of activities. From Bible study and prayer groups to social functions and entertainment; there is always so much going on.

We consider ourselves to be a Community Church, a church that offers far more than formal Sunday worship. With our three churches and the Lads' Club we engage with a very broad cross-section of our community. It is in the relationship that we are what church really is.

On a cold, wet June day a group of SHAL members enjoyed a fascinating tour of the gun batteries at Wanstone Farm, set back from the white cliffs in Dover, and a guided tour of the Fan Bay Deep Shelter. Since WW2 the site is now a National Trust property and a group of their volunteers have worked hard over recent years to clear the site, research and interpret life on the cliffs during the war years.

A small group of their volunteers showed members around an antiaircraft battery of 4 guns, named 'Jane' and in a circle, forming a line of flak which enemy planes flew into blocking the engines and bringing them down. The next feature was a massive gun emplacement (D2) supporting a huge gun, capable of firing into France, and an opportunity to stand on the site where Churchill had stood. The group then moved to Fan Bay, observing 6" gun emplacements and headed down the steep stairs to end up 23m below the surface deep into the chalk where the first tunnel housed 180 men working, sleeping in rows of bunks and taking shelter when not manning the guns. Further on in a drier section there were two large shells in the roof of the bare chalk, evidence of early sub-tropical climate. Continuing outside onto the cliff face there were two mounted WW1 sound dishes. The tour ended with the return journey back to the surface. Our appreciation to Fan Bay volunteers John Jarvest and Gordon Wise and colleagues for this fascinating tour.

The next meeting on 18 July will be a talk by SHAL member, Janet Powell, on a revolt in the 1930s about nearby tithes.



Perhaps the straight and narrow path would be wider if more people used it.
